


Another *%\$@! Questionaire

*%\$@! in a nutshell

As would be expected, there was a pattern to the responses.

The three most often mentioned 'important issues facing you as a youth worker/your organisation' were:

- * shortage resources
- * accomodation
- * need for contact and co-ordination between other agencies.

The four most-often mentioned 'functions of a state-wide youth affairs network' were:

- * provide/share information
- * lobby/advocate for needs of youth /the field
- * co-ordinate services
- * make/maintain contacts amongst the field

In terms of 'what a youth affairs network in Queensland could do for you/ your organisation', the most-often mentioned function was:

* provide information (on youth affairs / innovative responses / available resources)

The next most-often mentioned functions were:

- * advocacy
- * networking (iniating and building relationships between young people and youth workers / amongst youth workers)



Field Visits



You have probably heard that the State and Federal governments have responded to the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission Report by agreeing to co-operate in addressing the problems of Youth Homelessness.

Several Government Departments involved in accommodation, education, health, income security and other services to homeless youth have allocated extra funding and are developing policy initiatives. These departmental responses are being co-ordinated in Queensland by an Interdepartmental Committee with wide representation from State and Federal Departments.

Guidelines and funding processes for grants available to community groups are still being finalised and will be distributed shortly.

'Burdekin Initiatives'

In the meantime, the Federal Department of Community Services and Health have employed Rhonda Phillips and Lurline Comerford to resource and co-ordinate 'Burdekin Initiatives' in Queensland. Rhonda has several years experience in Community Development and Youth Affairs including five years as co-ordinator of Youth Housing Service in Gympie. She has been active in peak bodies advocating for your homeless people including a time as chairperson of the National Youth Coalition for Housing (NYC).

Lurline has also worked for many years in the community youth and housing sector, in particular at the Youth Advocacy Centre and Tenants Union of Queensland.

Rhonda and Lurline will be liaising with Government Departments and Community groups regarding Burdekin Initiatives and Youth Homelessness. WHAT IS Y.E.L.?

YEL stands for the Youth Electoral Lobby. YEL is a campaign based network of young people and organisations who are committed to influence politicians, political candidates and the electorate about youth issues.

YEL is not a centralised organisation but a loose alliance of organisations focusing on election issues - its' aims are to:

- prior to elections influence party policy, seek commitment to youth issues
- during elections publicise youth agenda
- after elections lobby elected members to keep to youth strategy commitments.

YEL is You, working in your local area to raise consciousness about youth related issues which affect you.

YEL will allow young people a right to participate in the shaping of their own futures. It will form a network of organisations and individuals who will be committed to its aims;

: To act as a reminder to politicians at every level of government, reminding them that their power is derived from the people, and they only continue to have that right in so far as they represent the interests of all the people. Therefore, whether they have the policies, they are the ones who will have to live with the consequences of those decisions.

: The Youth Electoral Lobby exists to remind young people of their actual power. Allowing them to enjoy and express their rights of being full participants in the Australian community and shaping its future.

: The Youth Electoral Lobby will enhance the image of young people in a manner that allows the wider community to realise the potential of young people. It will also attempt to break downs the adolescent stereotypes conveyed through the mass media.

: It will build a broad network across the various sub-groups of the youth sector. It will enable sharing of information and intensify the sector to speak to government with one voice and greater authority.

Y.E.L. LAUNCHED

On Monday 27th November the Youth Electoral Lobby was launched at a small press conference in the Brisbane City Botanic Gardens.

The launch was planned to coincide with the lead up to the State Election. It aimed to bring youth issues to the attention of politicians from all political parties and to question why young people had not been on the election agenda.

While there was not a great deal of activity related to the launch before the election, it was a chance to raise the concept publicly and to start the politicians thinking. Further activities will hopefully be planned for the lead up to the Federal Election.

YEL aims to empower young people by providing information to enable them to participate in electoral processes and give them a greater chance of affecting decisions which are of particular relevance to their lives.

Young people around the state will be encouraged to register with YEL by purchasing a kit for \$3, which includes a poster, sticker, a badge and suggestions about taking action at election time.

YEL is not just aimed at young people who are of voting age, but is also aimed at helping to educate young people under 18 about the electoral systems and how they can influence governments. YEL is also about telling politicians that young people, whether they can vote yet or not, are important and deserve to be listened to.

YEL is being sponsored at present in Queensland by the Youth Affairs Network of Queensland. It is hoped that other youth organisations in Queensland will also take up sponsorship of **YEL** in the near future.

THE MISSION

The team's mission is to provide a regionally based network that brings together young people, community organisations and Government Departments for the purpose of building an integrated, equitable, holistic and empowering service to young people.

THE GOALS

To achieve this, the field services staff will

- * Represent and promote the functions of the Division of Youth throughout each Regions by:
- promoting programs and resource
- assisting in the assessment of funding applications
- promoting and supporting the Youth Sector
- providing information concerning local needs and youth issues to the Division of Youth
- * Provide an information and referral service to young people, youth organisations and agencies in each Region by:
- providing a "shop front" information service to young people and youth organisations/agencies on a range of issues such as education and training, employment, health, accommodation, legal matters, income security and recreation.
- referring young people to appropriate agencies and services, particularly disadvantaged young people.
- * Facilitate the co-ordination of local youth services within each Region by:
- liaising with youth service providers in the Region

- -developing and resourcing a regional network of Government and non-Government youth workers.
- * Assist in the development of community educations programs for young people within each Region by:
- raising the level of awareness of the need for continuing
- education.
- increasing the educational opportunities for young people not involved in full-time educational programs.

THE FUTURE

The Field Services team is drawn from the ranks of experienced youth workers. 1990 is the first year of the team's operation throughout the State and it heralds new initiatives in the co-ordination of effective Government and non-Government services to young people.



Project "Pay Packet" is a Queensland Government initiative designed to reduce unemployment in the 15 to 21 year age group. The project was initiated in mid-1988 and will run to mid-1991.

There are two broad thrusts to the initiative. The first is to provide a personalised service to young people in the target age group who have been unemployed for more than six months. The second is to encourage the employers of Queensland to develop a positive attitude towards employing young people.

Services to the young unemployed are offered through 18 Project "Pay Packet" offices which are located in and around Brisbane, and in major regional centres from Cairns to the Gold Coast and west to Mt Isa. Youth Employment Co-ordinators working from these offices provide counselling services, attempt to place clients in work, assist clients to undertake training, and occasionally advise them to return to school.

training

Particular emphasis is placed on providing the young unemployed with training which will make them more attractive to employers. Youth Employment Co-ordinators are conversant with the wide range of courses available through TAFE Colleges and private training organisations such as commercial colleges. They also become involved in the development of new courses designed specifically for their young clients.

Youth Employment Co-ordinators also liaise with employers in their areas seeking job opportunities on behalf of their clients. This service allows the co-ordinator to recommend young people who have the right training, aptitude and interest for particular jobs. Maintaining regular contact with potential employers also gives the Co-ordinator a good indication of any areas where there may be skills shortages. He or she can then direct young, unemployed people to courses which qualify them for work in areas where there is demand.

advertising enthusiasm

Project "Pay Packet" funds have also been used to cover the cost of a major advertising campaign designed to encourage employers to change their attitude towards the young. The campaign has featured television, radio and newspaper advertisements asking employers to consider the enthusiasm and enormous potential of today's youth.

RESOURCE YOUTH

December 2, 1989, was an historic day for Queensland; will it also be the start of a new era for Queensland's Youth Affairs?

The following summary of the State Labor Party's Youth Policy "Resource Youth" is a kind of appetizer for the three or more years to come.

Based on the premise that the young people of Queensland are to be seen as a major resource in the struggle towards economic recovery, this policy outlines the Labor Party's plans for assisting that resource achieve its maximum (economic) potential.

EDUCATION

- * "The strong relationship which exists between education, training and employment is well know."
- * "A State Labor Government will provide our education system with the resources necessary to offer greater educational and employment opportunities to young Queenslanders".
- *"Students will be encouraged to complete their secondary education and improve the skills they need for work in adult life. This does not mean that secondary schools will become vocational training institutions. Rather they will provide the general skills which will enable students to maximise their employment options when they enter the labour force."
- * "In addition Labor is committed to improving training and opportunities for these who leave school."
- * "Employers will also benefit from a number of financial incentives to encourage them to employ and train young Queenslanders."
- * "A Labor Government will also boost access to tertiary education for young Queenslanders."

To expand the occupational opportunities available to young people in our secondary schools, Labor will:

- "introduce a Life Skills course for years 8 to 12 to provide young people with information about such topics as work, finance, citizenship, and the law".
- "expand the range of technology-related courses in schools and T.A.F.E. colleges with a particular emphasis on computer education".
- "expand work experience programs for upper secondary students".
- "ensure integration and continuity between school and T.A.F.E. courses, traineeships and further education".
- "expand the existing Rural Community Youth Extension Services to provide additional educational and personal development opportunities for youth in rural areas".
- "endorse the National Policy for the Educations of Girls and encourage greater female participation in courses and jobs which have traditionally been dominated by males".

TERTIARY EDUCATION


"Labor will move decisively to create additional places in Technical and Further Education, our Universities and Colleges of Advanced Education".

FOR SCHOOL LEAVERS

- + "A major commitment is this area will be the establishment of youth traineeships in addition to those being generated under the Australian Government's Traineeship System".
- + "A range of initiatives will be taken to make the indenturing of apprentices more attractive to the private sector by reducing the cost of providing apprenticeship training".
- + "Consistent with our commitment to employment and training, additional support must be made available to assist country apprentices with accommodation and travel expenses".
- + "Labor will also introduce public transport fare concessions for our young unemployed".
- + "Among other initiatives to expand regional employment will be special focus on the rapidly expanding tourism and hospitality industry".

FOR EMPLOYERS


- "Employers will benefit from Labor's initiatives to raise the skills levels of the Queensland workforce through an expansion of apprenticeships".
- "Employers taking part in our employment and training initiatives will gain through:



- ~"rebates to employers for workers' compensation payments for apprentices".
- ~"extension of the existing payroll tax exemptions for first year apprentices and Group Apprenticeships, to all apprentices".
- ~"payroll tax rebates to employers who engage for at least 12 months' employment additional employees under the ages of 25 years who have been unemployed for nine months or more".
