

In December 1989 the Beenleigh and Districts Interagency received funding under SAAP to set up a Youth Accommodation Project in the North Albert region. The service is now operating under the name Beenleigh Area Youth Service (BAYS) and consists of a community Placement Program and an unsupervised Youth Housing Program. Linda Ford and Tim Wilson have been employed to establish the respective programs.

The North Albert area is growing at a phenomenol rate. The annual population growth rate is around 13%, compared with 2.3% for Queensland. Many of the area's families are on low incomes, with 35.4% of families receiving less than \$15,000 per annum. The Eagleby region has the highest unemployment rate within the Brisbane Statistical Division. Finally, 50.3% of the population are under 25 years of age. It is an area where great need is being addressed by relatively few services.

The youth service hopes to be established and operating by mid-April, to begin addressing the needs of the area's young people. If you would like any more information, contact Linda or Tim on (07) 287 5511.

#### THE SHOUT CAMPAIGN

#### The Sex Discrimination Act Can Protect You....

The **Shout Campaign** is a nationwide campaign on sexual harassment specifically aimed at women 15 - 25 years of age. The campaign will be launched by the Federal Sex Discrimination Commissioner, Quentin Bryce, in early July and will continue through to the end of this year.

This campaign has been developed in direct response to the increasing number of complaints and inquiries to the Commission from young women regarding sexual harassment

including stickers - one reading "SHOUT - Sexual Harassment is Out! and the other "Sexual Harassment doesn't Work Around Here". The SHOUT kit will be launched as a loose insert in the August edition of Cleo magazine, which will be on sale July 5.

Full page advertisements are being placed in Cleo, Cosmopolitan and Dolly magazines over four months from July. There will also be three weeks of radio advertising commencing July 9 on the major youth radio station in each capital city as well as major regional stations in each state.

A special toll-free information line called the Shoutline 008 02 1199 will be established June 18. The Shoutline will be staffed by Commission inquiry officers. Anyone may call for information on sexual harassment, talk to an inquiry officer or request copies of the SHOUT kit.

The Coalition is a relatively new group which began formally meeting in the latter months of 1989. A group of people who have been involved in the area of Juvenile Justice for a number of years began meeting to try and address their concerns regarding what was happening for young people in Queensland. This small group of people has grown to form a larger body now known as the Youth Justice Coalition. The Coalition consists of the following individuals and organisations, Youth Advocacy Centre, Brisbane Youth Service, Community of Inala Legal Service, Zig Zag, Youth Housing Project, Peter Walsh, Phil Costigan, Anne McMillan, Ian O'Connor, Wally Dethlefs, reps from Dept. Family Services and the Community Living Programme..

The aims and objectives of the coalition are: to co-ordinate the communities efforts to achieve a consistently just response to the needs of disadvantaged youth in Queensland.

The Coalition hopes to do this by: offering mutual support, by offering a forum for discussion and evaluation, by collecting, sharing and distributing information and by lobbying for freform.

The Coalition has begun work on achieving these aims by initiating links with Government bodies. However, developing links with the community sector is the main priority of the coalition.

To this end a half day consultation was held on April 5, in order to introduce the Coalition, decide on its future direction, and to gain support, credibility and energy. There was good attendance with much input and positive feedback. Eventually, five issues were decided on:

- (1) The education and training of those involved in the Juvenile Justice System.
- (2) The lobbying at all government levels (especially local) for resources and to further the political campaign for welfare to receive 2% of the Queensland State budget.

(3) The availability of legal assistance to young people.

(4) Research into and monitoring of the juvenile justice system, incarceration levels, crime prevention and options.

(5) Challenging existing structures; Health/child guidance model, preventative strateties, D.F.S. Community Development model; Police service; look at specialist accommodation for those not presently catered for.

Numerous strategies were suggested as ways of achieving the goals.

A follow-up meeting on April 24th sought to prioritise these strategies. The Coalition will initially be taking three well-researched strategies to the Department of Family Services. The liaison mechanism to make this posssible is already established.

The Youth Justice Coalition is unfunded. Donations and/or advice to rectify this situation would be gratefully received.

The next meeting will be on June 5th 9.30 am - 12.30 pm at 25 Hooker Street, Windsor.

## KIDS-IN-CRISIS



**Kids-in-Crisis** is a voluntary, community-based forum of people (lay and professional) concerned with the support and well-being of all families and youth. It began as a subcommittee of the Warwick and District Welfare Group when concerns were voiced at the extent of family breakdown and conflict between parents and their adolescent children. It is now managed by a Management Committee made up of local community citizens and professional workers.

#### The Aims and Objectives of Kids-in-Crisis are as follows -

- To be a resource for all families, parents and youth, especially when they are experiencing difficulties and needing advice or support.
- O To promote services (directed at families and youth) that supplement those of the Health, Education and Welfare organisations.
- To promote better co-ordination and co-operation amongst these organisations, thus bridging the gap between the community and agencies serving it.
- To convene and promote community education in the area of life, parenting, child development and issues directly affecting family life and youth.
- To promote increased participation by stable, well functioning families and citizens in support of disadvantaged and at risk families and youth.
- To raise funds as necessary to finance these objectives.

#### Values

- Kids-in-Crisis holds that the family is the basic unity of society, and the prime agency for the care, nurturing and socialisation of children.
- Kids-in-Crisis recognizes the inherent worth and dignity of all individuals.
- O Prevention is seen as better than cure. Education and support that enhances the quality of family life is better than treatment of breakdown and conflict within families.
- Kids-in-Crisis is non-profit, non-political, non-sectarian, non-denominational. It is an authorised sub-committee of the Warwick and District Welfare Group, an incorporated body limited by guarantee under the Queensland Companies Act.





Hi, my name is Leanne Rusker, my brother Shannon and I live in Inala.
I'm twelve years old and Shannon is nine years old. We both attend Drama
Classes every Tuesday afternoon at West End Primary School.
Our Drama class is the Aboriginal group attached to the Brisbane Contact

At present we are rehearsing a play to present at the Performing Arts Complex.

In the September school holidays our group will be going to Hopevale Aboriginal Mission (near Cairns) to perform. We will also be visiting the surrounding Aboriginal Missions to Hopevale and possibly performing in Townsville. It is a really good experience for all of us, because it helps us to be more confident and not to be embarrassed about speaking and acting in public.

Recently we attended a conference at Maroochydore. We performed in the National Arena, and were well appliaded. Wesley Enoch our Tutor and Lafe Charlton our Co-Ordinator, are both local Aboriginal people. Lafe is presently attending Youth Conference and Workshops overseas in Stockholme and London. He will be away eight weeks and we are eagerly awaiting his return with valuable Information and ideas to help us to improve our performances.

Seline Saunders our Aboriginal Youth Worker here in inala drives us in to our class in the bus. If your are interested in joining our group, contact Selina Saunders at the Inala Police Youth Club.

Both Shannon and I feel that acting is an ideal way to expressing our Culture and hopefully by doing this we will work at improving our race relationships.



# A Person or a Problem? Young people's experience of unemployment.

At a recent Youth Employment Seminar both young people and employers expressed disatisfaction and disapointment with current education in Queensland schools. From the young people's point of view they were not supplied with the necessary information to help them choose educational or career options, while the employer groups believe young people are not being furnished with the basic skills required for them to enter into skilled occupations.

These and other contentious issues were raised at the Youth Employment Seminar held by the Youth Employment Service within the Bureau of Employment, Vocational and Further Education and Training on the 21st June 1990.

The keynote speakers at the seminar were Peter Kirby, head of TAFE in South Australia and author of the ''Kirby Report''; Peter Henneken, Executive Director in the Bureau and Des Hodgeman, from the Queensland Master Builders Association.

During one of the afternoon workshops, young people told of their experiences of being unemployed. Interestingly, these young people had no complaints about government services per se (``... the government's doing a really good job offering all these courses ...''), they reserved their criticism for the service-deliverers. They spoke of being "made to feel bad" at the DSS and CES, and of how "downgrading" the attitudes of the workers can be. They also commented that the CES and DSS had not adequately informed them of their options. "The CES never told me a real lot about what was going". It seemed that they had each "walked into the DEVET Youth Employment Centre by accident", having never been told of its existence.

The service-deliverers at the Youth Employment Centres were, on the other hand, referred to in glowing terms, (much to the embarrasment of those present!), "DEVET treated me as a person, not a problem". The young people outlined how the Centres had helped them find the kind of training or work they were looking for. Most importantly, they commented on how the workers had helped to rebuild their shattered self-esteem. So highly reccommended were the DEVET Centres that a cynic might claim the speakers had been primed (!) however the comparison between the approach of the DEVET workers to young people with that of the CES and DSS workers does raise some questions.

The young people also noted there should be ''more co-operation between the Education Department and TAFE and the universities'. They wanted young people to have a say in the content of courses and in other things that concern them. Above all they believed the information they needed had not been readily available at the time it was needed: ''Unless you know where to go you're at a dead loss''.
